A Brief History Of The Tuskegee Airmen

The legendary **Tuskegee Airmen of WWII** were dedicated, determined young men who enlisted to become America's first black military aviators. This was at a time when there were many people who thought that black men lacked intelligence, skill, courage and patriotism.

In the air, the Tuskegee fliers were distinguished more by the color of their planes than the color of their skin.



The red paint on the tail of their aircraft earned them the nicknames "Red Tails" or "Red Angels" from fellow Allied pilots. German fighter pilots called them "Schwartze Vogelmenshen," which translates to "Black Birdmen." Their legend was created by becoming one of the most successful flying squadrons in American military history. Shattering racist stereotypes, they flew more than 15,000 sorties over North Africa and Europe during World War II, destroyed more than 250 enemy aircraft on the ground and 150 in the air and fiercely protected the American and Allied bombers they escorted on their missions.

General Lloyd W. "Fig" Newton (USAF Ret)



General Lloyd W. "Fig" Newton was commander of Air Education and Training Command, headquartered at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas. As commander, he was responsible for the recruiting, training, and education of Air Force personnel.

This command included The AF Recruiting Service, two numbered Air Forces and The Air University.

He completed pilot training at Williams AFB, AZ in June 1967 and then attended F-4D qualification training at George AFB, CA. He flew 269 combat missions in South Vietnam including 79 missions over North Vietnam. He was the first African American to be selected to join the USAF Thunderbirds Aerial Demonstration Squadron in November 1974 and held several positions including narrator, slot pilot, and right wingman. He commanded three wings and an air division, and held numerous staff positions and served as Director of Operations, J-3, and United States Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) from 1993-1995. The general was a command pilot with more than 4,000 flying hours in the T-37, T-38, F-4, F-15, F-16, C-12 and F-117 stealth fighter.


